^ 1. For 3-year GLB students, the total number of credits of elective modules per candidature is a range of 32-36. The total number of credits for the GLB degree including the 88 credits of compulsory modules must fall within a range of 120-124. In the 3rd Year of the GLB candidature, for the semester that students are reading Evidence, they are required to select a range of 20-23 credits in the online registration system. As such, students will only be allocated with no more than 15 credits of elective modules.

In the 3rd Year of the GLB candidature, for the semester that students are NOT reading Evidence, they are required to read and select a range of 17-19 credits in the online registration system. In the graduating semester, GLB students may write in to the Office of Academic Affairs at lawundergrad@nus.edu.sg if they are required to read beyond the stipulated range of 17-19 credits to meet the graduation requirements.

This constraint is due to the absolute cap of 120-124 credits that GLB students may read in their candidature at the Faculty of Law.

^ 2. All students must complete at least one law elective module from "Civil Law" cluster.
